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
Writing Activity 4: To write instructions

Look carefully over the instructions below and try to make your own pirate hat out of newspaper. Think about each step you need to take and how you could teach a friend to make a hat too.


Use a large rectangular piece of paper or newspaper.




2 Fold the paper in half.




Fold over the top corners so they meet in the middle.
